Background: Rotokare Scenic Reserve Trust

2004 – Trust established – initial lofty goal to raise \$30k for possum eradication

2008 – \$3m raised – 8.2km pest-proof fence & 12 mammalian pest species eradication

RSRT has never had financial debt


2010 – Environmental Education programme & onsite facilities, eradication declared successful

2012 – Species reintroductions began – Kiwi


2014 – Tieke – 1st species reintroduced to region

2015 – Halo Project underway


Community-owned & Community-led

Beyond the Halo – Future Biodiversity Corridor Linking multiple organisations & landowners




Sanctuary Biosecurity


- 45km's monitoring lines
- 1800 tracking tunnels
- 522 permanently set traps

Since Eradication

- 2 stoats (2009)
- 15 rats
- 317 mice
 - + 2 detailed toxin pulses for mice (2013 & 2016)







Hihi Restoration - an enormous commitment



2017-18 - 17 fledglings, 1st hihi hatched in Taranaki since 1880's

2018-19 - 43 fledglings banded

- Incl. natural nesting!

2019-20 - Population = 100+ ???

Effort

Translocation = 860+ person hours per translocation (Saturday to Saturday)

Annual hihi programme

1,200+ hours approx (Volunteers & Staff)

Sugar-water & hygiene

Every 3 days since 1st release, 3+ hours per day = 700+ hours

Goal #1: 40 genetically diverse founders - 2020 (33 founders to date, 4 more geographically isolated founders by Xmas 2019)

Goal #2: 1st Harvest & Translocation achieved - 2019

Goal #3: Sustainable annual harvest programme

Estimated current population: 150+ kiwi

Annual routine harvest prediction: 20-30 kiwi




Taranaki Kōhanga Kiwi at Rotokare 2019 – 2021 Harvest & translocation plans

- 1st pateke in Taranaki for c100 years +
 - Regional Restoration Goal
 - Most challenging Rotokare reintroduction yet










A very rough 2-weeks for the team – 8 of 20 pateke deceased (40% loss)




We had clearly underestimated the number of feral cats in the area

The next few weeks were pretty rough for feral cats



41 feral cats & 1 ferret dispatched - no further pateke deaths

The next step - A dormant grid of kill-traps for coordinated pulses



Pateke are now dispersing beyond the sanctuary & surviving
